"TARGET HARDENING" – A MESSAGE FROM COMMUNITY RELATIONS OFFICER MATT LEMOS

It has been more than a year since East Mountain Neighborhood Watch was formed. Through the last year the watch has proved to be an effective method to prevent crime and to help decrease crime within the neighborhood. Since its inception the watch, not only has gotten important information out to its neighbors, but has added additional Neighborhood Watch Signs throughout the neighborhood. The additional signs hung through the neighborhood and the decals residents placed in their windows advertise that East Mountain residents are committed to crime prevention, reports suspicious activity and would-be crimes to the Police Department.

I encourage anyone receiving this newsletter, who is not currently part of the Neighborhood Watch or email list, to contact their Block Watch Captain and join. The East Mountain Neighborhood Watch and the Police Department have formed an effective partnership and I have been in regular contact with many more East Mountain residents because of that partnership. Anyone wishing to obtain "Neighborhood Watch" window decals can contact: Watch Commander Bob McGovern (203)755-2847 or Association President Bob Perigard (203)753-2575. These decals are complements of your neighborhood association.

Through some of the training opportunities that the Police Department has provided to me were two series of Crime Prevention Courses that were instructed by the U.S. Justice Department. In these two courses I learned several different crime prevention methods, but they had all the same principle, "target hardening". Target hardening is making yourself or your property a harder target for a would-be criminal looking for a crime of opportunity. Here are some reminders that can help "target harden" East Mountain.



To "target harden" vehicles:

- ..Don't leave valuables in your vehicle: you would be surprised how often his happens, but individuals leave valuables in plain sight all the time. If you leave items in your car and they're visible, the chances your vehicle will get broken into greatly increase.
- ..Place items out of sight BEFORE reaching your destination: Someone may be watching when you put your valuables under a seat or in the trunk. Valuable items that thieves target are GPS Units, MP3 players, laptops, tablets, cellphones, credit cards, money/change, packages, etc.
- ..Lock ALL of your vehicles' doors. This is even true if you plan on being gone for "just a second." Lock vehicle doors wherever it is parked, driveway, road, or shopping center.
- ..Don't leave a trace: Don't leave any sign that their might be valuables "out of sight" in your vehicle.
- ..Don't leave spare keys within the vehicle.
- ..Alarms or anti-theft devices work: Thieves are usually looking for the "easiest" target. If your car has an alarm, don't make this common mistake: just because you have an alarm doesn't mean thieves won't break in if you have valuables in plain sight.
- ..Almost all auto break-ins have something in common: there was something left in the car worth stealing. Most larcenies from vehicles are "crimes of opportunity" that could possibly be prevented by taking some preventative steps to make your vehicle a harder target.

HOW TO BETTER PROTECT YOUR HOME

- ..Make sure all of your exterior doors have good locks. (At least deadbolts with a minimum of one inch throw). Always lock all doors when you leave, no matter for how long.
- ..Outside doors and their frames should be solid.
- ..Secure glass sliders with a bar and locks.
- .. Make sure that your windows have good locks and that you are using the locks.
- ..Trim bushes or trees that can conceal doors or windows. (These should be clearly visible at all times).

Keep spare keys with a trusted neighbor; do not hide under a door mat or in a flower pot.

- ..Keep a record of your property, such as serial numbers or distinctive features.
- .. Consider installing a home alarm system and placing alarm signs on your property.
- ..If you park your vehicle outside, never leave a garage door opener within that vehicle.
- ..Adequate exterior lighting is recommended, especially motion activated lights around entry ways to the home.

BOOK DRIVE

The Waterbury Reads Gently Used Children's Book drive seeks to put books into the hands of Waterbury's children. The book drive was founded when East Mountain resident Alderwoman Stephanie Cummings connected with Assistant Attorney General William Bumpus over a campaign trail discussion on the importance of education and reading. Shortly thereafter, Alderwoman Cummings set forth to mirror the New Haven book drive in Waterbury.

In the first year of creating the book drive Alderwoman Cummings collected over 20,000 books for the Children of Waterbury! Through a dynamic partnership with Tina Agati of Literacy Volunteers and the City of Waterbury the books are delivered to children across the City. The books are stored in a facility on Church Street in downtown before they are delivered to children. A main goal of the book drive is to reach children in targeted communities who may not have access to age appropriate reading material at home. To facilitate this, the team visits locations where the children are already likely to be with their parents, including Stay Well Health Center, PAL, the Waterbury Green, and Mardi Gross in Library Park – among many other locations and events. The book drive made an appearance at the East Mountain/ East End Community Club movie nights in August.

EAST MOUNTAIN NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH PROGRAM


East Mountain Neighborhood Association is in its second year of a Neighborhood Watch Program to enlist citizen participation and involvement to help prevent petty crime in our area. East Mountain has been divided into seven sections with each section having its own captain (see list below). If you see or hear of anything suspicious you should always call the police first. If the police confirm that a crime has been committed then you would notify your section captain and then the section captain would notify the watch commander who would inform all our neighbors via email. This is a program which is set up to be proactive, not reactive. The concerned citizen is a criminal's worst enemy. If you would like to know more about our Neighborhood Watch Program you are more than welcome to join us at our monthly meetings on the 3rd Wednesday of every month. Hope to see you there.


